EXECUTIVE SUMMARY/INTRODUCTION

Housing is a basic human need. On any given day, thousands of men, women, and children are homeless in Kentucky. Every year Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC), as the lead agency for the Balance of State (BoS) Continuum of Care (CoC), submits the Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR) for use by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the U.S. Congress.

Kentucky has three CoCs: BoS CoC (including 118 counties), the Lexington/Fayette County CoC, and the Louisville/Jefferson County CoC. Each CoC is responsible for submission of their AHAR. HUD and Congress use this report for analysis of future funding decisions and evaluation of homeless trends. The BoS CoC AHAR is combined with all other nationwide CoC AHARs for national analysis of estimated homelessness, demographic characteristics of homeless persons, service patterns, and capacity/utilization rates.

On a local level, this report is meant to be a resource for stakeholders in each community to strategically evaluate their funding needs and the trends of homelessness in their area. KHC will publish the AHAR every year in conjunction with other reports to better inform stakeholders of the progress being made to end homelessness in Kentucky.

This report is based on data shared by community partners through the Kentucky Homeless Management Information System (KYHMIS) for the reporting year October 1, 2012, through September 30, 2013.

The report highlights the continued decrease in yearly homelessness from 9,037 in 2012 to 8,561 in 2013 (5 percent decrease). BoS continues to see a decrease in the number of children served yearly under HUD's definition of homeless, a decrease of 3 percent. The utilization rates of beds in emergency shelters and transitional housing projects showed a decrease in the use by families (14 and 1 percent, respectively).

Overall, the BoS CoC 2012-2013 AHAR again reflects positive changes in the homeless population. For the second year in a row, BoS CoC is reporting another 5 percent decrease in the overall homeless population served in a 12-month period of time. This is a 10 percent decrease in overall homelessness since federal fiscal year (FFY) 2010-2011.

Data is reported in six categories: Persons in Families in Emergency Shelter, Individuals in Emergency Shelter, Persons in Families in Transitional Housing, Individuals in Transitional Housing, Persons in Families in Permanent Supportive Housing, and Individuals in Permanent Supportive Housing. All client information is unduplicated for the purposes of this report. The estimates used are an

"extrapolated count" based on the assumption that beds located in projects that do not participate in KYHMIS are occupied at the same rate as beds located in KYHMIS-participating projects.

Victim Service Provider (VSP) client information is not included in this report, nor are they included in the extrapolated estimates of homelessness based on Section 106 of The Violence Against Women Act of 2005. VSPs are defined as agencies whose primary mission is to provide services to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individuals or a family member.

The BoS CoC must meet HUD reporting standards to be included in the national AHAR. Emergency shelters, transitional housing projects, and permanent supportive housing projects must show a greater than 50 percent KYHMIS bed-coverage rate. The KYHMIS covers 54 percent of emergency shelter beds, 90 percent of transitional housing beds, and 90 percent of permanent supportive housing beds. BoS has shown an increase in bed coverage for permanent supportive housing only, while client-level data for those in emergency shelters and transitional housing captured in KYHMIS has decreased (14 and 8 percent respectively) since FFY 2011-2012.

Data quality must meet a standard of less than 10 percent overall missing data elements. The BoS CoC had 0 percent missing data in 59 out of 78 data elements (76 percent), showing a 20 percent improvement in data quality from FFY 2011-2012. Of the remaining data elements, BoS showed less than 10 percent missing data elements in 17 out of 78 elements and only 2 elements showed a greater than 10 percent missing data percentage. Both elements were destination for clients at project exit, one in permanent supportive housing for families and permanent supportive housing for individuals.

Each year, KHC strives to become more reliant on empirical data shared with us by our partners through KYHMIS. The AHAR is a tool to share the true story of homelessness in Kentucky.

*Families are defined as any household that includes at least one adult over the age of 18 and at least one child under the age of 18. All other persons, including those in multi-person households consisting of only adults or only children, are reported in the individual category.

¹ This reports provides estimates of the homeless individuals and persons in families in Emergency Shelter and transitional housing programs that participate in HMIS, as well as those that do not participate in HMIS. The estimate is an “extrapolated count” and is based on the assumption that beds located in programs that do not participate in HMIS are occupied at the same rate as beds located in HMIS-participating programs. The complete derivation of the total extrapolation factors is detailed in the next table.

Adding values across categories will double count persons who appeared in multiple types of programs.

The estimates do not include persons that are served by "victim service providers," including rape crisis centers, battered women's shelters, domestic violence transitional housing programs, and other programs whose primary mission is to provide services to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking.

Exhibit 1.3 Estimated Homeless Counts: Point in Time Counts




Exhibit 1.4 Estimated Homeless Counts: Number of Families




Exhibit 1.5 Estimated Homeless Counts: Estimated Average Utilization Rate




Exhibit 1.6 Estimated Homeless Counts: Turnover Rate




Exhibit 1.7 Estimated Homeless Counts: Persons in Families in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 1.9 Estimated Homeless Counts: Persons in Families in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 1.10 Estimated Homeless Counts: Individuals in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 1.11 Estimated Homeless Counts: Individuals in Transitional Housing





Exhibit 1.12 Estimated Homeless Counts: Individuals in Permanent Supportive Housing

Exhibit 3.2 Demographic Characteristics: Gender of Adults




Exhibit 3.3 Demographic Characteristics: Gender of Children




Exhibit 3.4 Demographic Characteristics: Race of Persons in Families in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 3.5 Demographic Characteristics: Race of Persons in Families in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 3.6 Demographic Characteristics: Race of Persons in Families in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 3.7 Demographic Characteristics: Race of Individuals in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 3.8 Demographic Characteristics: Race of Individuals in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 3.9 Demographic Characteristics: Race of Individuals in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 3.10 Race




Exhibit 3.11 Demographic Characteristics: Age of Persons in Families in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 3.12 Demographic Characteristics: Age of Persons in Families in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 3.13 Demographic Characteristics: Age of Persons in Families in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 3.14 Demographic Characteristics: Age of Individuals in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 3.15 Demographic Characteristics: Age of Individuals in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 3.16 Demographic Characteristics: Age of Individuals in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 3.17 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size: Persons in Families in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 3. 18 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size: Persons in Families in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 3. 19 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size: Persons in Families in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 3.20 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size: Individuals in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 3.21 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size: Individuals in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 3.22 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size: Individuals in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 3.23 Demographic Characteristics: Persons by Household Size




Exhibit 3.24 Demographic Characteristics: Veteran Status (Adults Only)





Exhibit 3.25 Demographic Characteristics: Disabled (Adults Only)

Exhibit 4.2 Living Arrangement the Night before Program Entry: Persons in Families in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 4.3 Living Arrangement the Night before Program Entry: Persons in Families in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 4.4 Living Arrangement the Night before Program Entry: Individuals in Emergency Shelter




Exhibit 4.5 Living Arrangement the Night before Program Entry: Individuals in Transitional Housing




Exhibit 4.6 Living Arrangement the Night before Program Entry: Persons in Families in Permanent Supportive Housing




Exhibit 4.7 Living Arrangement the Night before Program Entry: Individuals in Permanent Supportive Housing





Exhibit 4.8 Prior Living Situation: Living Arrangement the Night Before Program Entry

Exhibit 4.9 Stability of Previous Night's Living Arrangement




Exhibit 4.10 Zip Code of Last Permanent Address





Exhibit 4.1 Length of Stay in Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing for Persons
