Narrative

The Consolidated Plan was developed through extensive consultation with the Commonwealth of Kentucky’s partner organizations and other stakeholders, as well as broad input from community members. Intergovernmental departments, affordable housing providers, advocates and other key community stakeholders played an integral role. The Consolidated Plan is also informed by information gathered from several recently published reports and statewide housing, community, and economic development services that inform current conditions and projected outcomes for a variety of sectors that will impact the community. Service providers shared their insights through participation in regional public meetings, GoTo Meeting sessions, the KAHC19 Stakeholder sessions, and an online survey. Extensive public outreach was conducted to allow other community members to input into the plan, including regional public meetings and the online survey.

This section summarizes the extensive consultation and citizen outreach conducted both collectively and individually by the regional consolidated plan jurisdictions.

KHC is the lead agency for preparation of the Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans, and Analysis of Impediments with the Kentucky Department for Local Government.

1. Introduction

KHC and DLG conducted extensive consultation with a broad range of partners, stakeholders and community members in the development of the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan. To enhance coordination among partners, the process leveraged the ongoing work of KHC and the affordable housing agencies the process included participation in the annual stakeholder workshops. In addition, during Regional Public meetings, a broad range of government and nonprofit agencies that provide affordable housing, mental health and other social services throughout the northern, western, and southern Kentucky regions.

The following provides additional details on these coordination activities.

Provide a concise summary of the state’s activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

Online Survey: An online survey was created in Survey Monkey and the link distributed through the KHC project webpage, on the FAQ sheets and the presentations made at the Regional Public Meetings and the KAHC19 Stakeholder Workshops. At KAHC19, workshop attendees were encouraged to respond to the survey as they entered the meeting room. The survey was also marketed at the end of the GoToMeeting sessions. The survey was live from August 6 through October 4, 2019; a total of 127 responses were received and tabulated. Of these, only one Spanish response was received. Please refer to the Appendix in AD-25 for detailed information about the Online Survey results.

Regional Public Meetings: Three regional public meetings were held from August 19th through 21st in northern, western, and eastern parts of the state. Each meetings were held in handicap accessible locations. During the first meeting in Independence, Kentucky held at the Kenton County Public Library William E. Durr Branch from 10:00am to 12:00pm EST on August 19th, there were a total of six attendees. During the second meeting in Hopkinsville, Kentucky held at the Hopkinsville-Christian County Library from 10:00am to 12:00pm CST at August 20th, there were a total of fourteen attendees. The final meeting was held on August 21st at the Pikeville from 1:00pm to 3:00pm EST, there were a total of three attendees. At each meeting, a brief presentation was made then participants were asked five questions. Across the three locations, the most frequently cited responses to each question are listed in the Appendix in AD-25.

Stakeholder Workshops: Two stakeholder workshops were conducted at the Kentucky Affordable Housing Conference (KAHC19) on September 12 and 13 at the Lexington Convention Center. This venue was selected because the typical conference attendees include affordable housing developers, builders,

advocates and other entities who work in the affordable housing arena. The two stakeholder workshops were two or more than fifteen sessions participants could self-select to attend over three days and three different time slots. During the first stakeholder workshop on September 12 from 10:15am to 11:45am EST, at the Lexington Convention Center, at a handicap accessible location, there was a total of twelve attendees. During the second stakeholder workshop on September 13 from 10:30am to 12:00pm EST, also at a handicap accessible location, there was a total of eight attendees. At each workshop, a brief presentation was made then participants were asked four questions, similar to the Regional Public Meetings. The most frequently cited responses can be found in the Appendix in AD-25.

GoToMeeting Sessions: The final opportunity for input included a series of four online GoToMeeting sessions. These were advertised on the KHC project webpage, on the FAQ sheets, at the Regional Public Meetings and the KAHC19 Stakeholder Sessions. KHC also distributed e-grams using its own agency listserv to remind stakeholders of the session schedule and details. Two sessions were conducted per day from October 1 to October 2. The format of these sessions was similar to the Regional Public Meetings and KAHC19 Stakeholder Workshops with a series of five questions posed to participants.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness

KHC is the lead agency, coordinating the Balance of State Continuum of care (118 of Kentucky's 120 counties). In addition to coordinating the Balance of State CoC, KHC works with the state Cabinet for Health and Family Services to manage programs that assist homeless veterans, persons with persistent mental illness, and youth aging out of foster care, three populations that are at high risk of becoming homeless.

KHC and the Housing and Homeless Coalition of Kentucky are the lead agencies for the Kentucky Interagency Council on Homelessness (KICH). KICH is composed of representation from state government, nonprofit agencies, and advocacy agencies who collaborate and perform duties related to serving special needs populations, including the homeless. Representatives of state cabinets and nonprofit organizations (including, but limited to, those who serve veterans, homeless, families with children and youth aging out of foster care) are active participants on the executive committee and subcommittees.

KHC offers to other agencies that serve the homeless across the state the opportunity to participate in the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Continuum of Care (CoC) Program. The CoC is a local or regional system for helping people who are homeless, or at risk of homelessness, by providing housing and services appropriate to the whole range of homeless needs in the community. Through the

CoC Program, agencies can serve clients with supportive services, transitional housing, permanent supportive housing, or rapid re-housing.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the state in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards and evaluate outcomes, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the administration of HMIS

The Kentucky Balance of State CoC process begins at the local level with six regional planning entities for 118 counties across the state. The City of Lexington as well as the City of Louisville have their own CoC application process and are funded separately from the Balance of State CoC.

In the Kentucky Balance of State CoC, service providers, developers, community leaders, advocates, financial institutions, and homeless service clients meet as local CoC Planning Boards in each of the six regions. At numerous local planning meetings held throughout the year, participants evaluate their service delivery system, coordinate plans in order to avoid duplication, share resources, and establish goals for eliminating gaps in the local delivery system. This community-based process assesses services from prevention to self-sufficiency in permanent housing.

KHC, as the Collaborative Applicant for the Balance of State CoC, has the unique opportunity and ability to reach out to members of the CoC in order to obtain feedback and guidance. Through regional CoC meetings, information is routinely shared on the anticipated timeline for the allocation of the Emergency Solutions Grant funds. CoC Webinars give KHC ESG staff an opportunity to present information about the annual plan and to field questions from CoC partner agencies on the potential roll-out of the funding.

Additionally, KHC holds regional CoC meetings where ESG staff present updates to program guidelines and request feedback on potential changes to the allocation process in future funding rounds. KHC ESG program staff also participate in the CoC process for the Louisville and Lexington area, attending their regular monthly meetings. This allows them to provide regular information about and receive feedback on the Kentucky ESG process. In addition to the webinars and regional CoC meetings, KHC, as Collaborative Applicant coordinates the Balance of State CoC Board which guides the decisions affecting the CoC. The Balance of State CoC Board, made up of 12 agency representatives from across the state and of a cross-section of homeless and special needs service providers, will continue to be a pivotal link to the CoC and the larger services community. The Board will be working with ESG staff on implementation of the HEARTH Act rules, analyzing system performance and recommending funding mechanisms that allow for the best service delivery across the state and across populations. In addition, as the roll-out of the Coordinated Assessment system continues, the CoC Board and KHC will be working to smooth out the bumps along the way.

KHC also communicates very often with partners via eGram service. Thousands of people subscribe to this service for periodic messages on ESG and other programs. KHC often uses this tool to invite comments on various programs and policies.

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Identify any Agency Types not consulted and provide rationale for not consulting

Efforts were made to include a wide range of community stakeholders in the consultation, focus group, and survey process. No agencies were intentionally excluded from participation. Kentucky Communications Network Authority (KCNA), a state agency, is responsible for the Kentucky Wired initiative, a state-run project constructing over 3,000 miles of high-speed, high-capacity fiber optic cable in every county in Kentucky. During the Consolidated Planning process, KHC and DLG notified the public and held three public outreach meetings and four virtual meetings, which were made available to all state agencies. Organizations and individuals were given the opportunity to participate and provide comments on the Plan. While consultation was sought via these outreach meetings, none was received related to "Services - Broadband Internet Service Providers or Services - Narrowing the Digital Divide".

The Assessment provided a demand analysis of Multifamily Programs, Housing Choice Voucher Program, and Homeless Outreach Programs (CoC, ESG, and HOPWA). The identified demands overlap with Goal 2: HOME Rental Assistance, Goal 3: HOME Multifamily Activities, Goal 4: Emergency Shelter Grant Activities, Goal 5: HOPWA Activities, and Goal 11: Housing Trust Fund Multifamily Activities.

Olmstead Housing Initiative (2017)	Kentucky Housing Corporation	The Olmstead Housing Initiative (OHI) is a partnership between Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC) and the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, Department for Behavioral Health and Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities (DBHDID, or the Department). The goal of the initiative is to address a pressing need for housing for people who are currently in, or at risk of entering, institutions, such as psychiatric hospitals or personal care homes, or who have a history of frequent institutionalizations. OHI is a 36-month bridge program, which enables participants to become leased in permanent housing. Participants who cannot find permanent housing options in the 36-month time frame may continue Olmstead Housing assistance upon approval of DBHDID until permanent housing can be secured. The report informed the housing needs assessment and specifically overlap with Goal 2: HOME Rental Assistance in terms of prioritizing permanent supportive housing.

Describe cooperation and coordination among the State and any units of general local government, in the implementation of the Consolidated Plan (91.315(I))

The Consolidated Plan was developed jointly by the Kentucky Housing Corporation and the Department of Local Governments. The departments coordinated directly with the Commonwealth of Kentucky non-entitlement areas development of the plan and worked together on an ongoing basis. KHC cooperates and coordinate with DLG extensively with regard to the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. These contacts and relationships include, but are not limited to:

- Conference round tables and the Governor’s Local Issues Conference, Kentucky Association of Counties, and Kentucky League of Cities meetings.
- Meetings with Area Development District Directors, including CDBG guidelines training
- Information on the Department for Local Government website contains information related to CDBG, and is accessible to local governments to aid in project planning and application submission
- The annual Public Hearing held by KHC for the Consolidated Plan and Action Plan, as well as the CDBG annual hearing held with the Legislative Research Commission also acts to coordinate implementation of the program.

Narrative (optional):

Kentucky’s Ten Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness (2012), led by Kentucky Interagency Council on Homelessness/Kentucky Housing Corporation - The Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness is a document summarizing key accomplishments toward addressing issues of Kentucky’s homelessness, as well as targeted regional strategies to continue the state’s work to end homelessness. The report identified that Kentucky must work to provide more supportive services, prevention strategies for discharge planning, alternatives to incarceration and emergency assistance, as well as the coordination of these services, must occur to prevent the ongoing issues of homelessness.

Kentucky’s Strategic Plan to End Homelessness (2018), led by Kentucky Interagency Council on Homelessness - Kentucky made great strides toward improving statewide strategies to address planning and coordination of behavioral health, primary care services, and access to permanent housing to reduce homelessness. Overlaps with Goal 4: Emergency Shelter Grant Activities as the Plan is seeking to encourage and support agencies providing emergency shelter and/or crisis beds to lower programmatic barriers to services. Also overlaps with Goal 9: CDBG Services providing support for Recovery Kentucky as the Plan seeks to strengthen the discharge process for persons exiting substance abuse programs.

Kentucky Hazard Mitigation Plan (2018), led by Kentucky Emergency Management - The Commonwealth of Kentucky Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan for 2018 allow the Commonwealth to maximize mitigation activity and administer a comprehensive mitigation program and effectively use mitigation funding. Goal IV of the Mitigation Plan: Increase integration of commonwealth and federal agencies’ policies, programs, funding sources, projects, and planning (to reduce vulnerabilities to jurisdictions and to commonwealth-owned and commonwealth-operated buildings, infrastructure, and critical facilities). Overlaps with the goals of Goal 8: CDBG Public Facilities and Goal 10: CDBG Public Improvements/Infrastructure.

Findings from the Recovery Center Outcome Study – Annual Report (2019), led by Kentucky Housing Corporation/University of Kentucky Center on Drug & Alcohol Research - The annual report is comprehensive review of the findings from the Recovery Kentucky program, a program created to help Kentuckian recover from substance abuse, providing housing and recovery services for up to 2,200 persons simultaneously. The report emphasizes the value of recovery services as a key part of the state commitment to intervening with the growing problem of substance abuse in Kentucky. This goal directly overlaps with Goal 9: CDBG Services providing ongoing support for Recovery Kentucky.
